VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT ON: CANDITA GERZEVITZ LVKC TUTOR

How long have you been Volunteering for LVKC and why is literacy important to you?

Lhave been a volunteer tutor for LVKC since 2002. Life has taught that literacy is the key to education, and education is a key to opportunity and self-fulfillment.

What has been your most challenging experience with LVKC and/or your most rewarding?

Have you learned anything about yourself from volunteering?

My students teach me lessons about courage and perseverance. Coincidentally – or maybe not coincidentally – all of them show remarkable love and consideration for others, and they are very smart. I am learning to never give up.

What do you do when you are not volunteering?



The Sound of Glass by Karen White is a complex story with wonderful characters. After reading the book recently, I am now rereading it.





Prior to taking the Tutor Training Workshop (TTW), prospective tutors must take 2 required classes on line at www.proliteracyednet.org/. These free classes are Called *Principles of Adult Learning* and *Working with Adult Literacy Learners*. Upon completion, prospective tutors will be provided with certifications which they will submit with their registration to the TTW. Tutor training is then conducted in a series of workshops totaling 15 hours in a classroom setting. Midway through training, volunteers are matched with students so that they may experience the tutoring process and receive guidance as needed. At the conclusion of training, tutors are certified.

MACARONS FROM SCRATCH

Macarons came from France in 1792. They're getting more popular around the world. They are common at parties. Children like them very much and adults do too. Today I am going to share a recipe that I made from scratch.

Ingredients:

1 cup almond flour1 2/3 cups powdered sugar1/4 cup white sugar2 large egg whites1/4 cup green tea powder

Chocolate Filling:

3/4 cup solid chocolate (chopped) 1/4 cup unsalted butter 3/4 cup heavy cream

First, I used a scale to measure the right amount of dry ingredients. You can see that I converted the metric weight measurements to cups because recipes in America don't use the metric system.

After that, we need two egg whites. Using an electric whisk, pour the sugar into the egg whites a bit at a time until the egg whites are frothy. Sift the almond flour, powdered sugar and green tea powder into the egg whites bowl. Fold the ingredients together gently.

Spoon the mixture into a pastry bag. If you don't have pastry bag, cut the corner of a baggy. Pipe the ingredients onto the parchment paper in rounds. Let them sit for half an hour until the tops are firm and not sticky. (the top is hard)





Preheat the oven to 280 °F degrees or 140 °C degrees. Bake them for 10-15 minutes. Let them cool down on a baking sheet before you fill them. Make the filling while you are waiting for the macarons to cool. Pour the heavy cream in the pan and heat the cream slowly; be careful not to boil it. Add the chocolate and butter and stir that until smooth. Cool completely and sandwich the macarons with chocolate filling.

Hope everyone enjoys them, my first attempt was a flop. My second attempt was a hit. My family all loved them, and all gave me a **thumbs up !!!**
