All American Boys Brendan Kiely & Jason Reynolds

Rashad and Quinn—one black, one white, both American—face the unspeakable truth that racism and prejudice didn't die after the civil rights movement. This is a multi-faceted look at race relations in America.**

The Crossover Kwame Alexander

Josh and his twin brother Jordan are awesome on the court. But Josh has more than basketball in his blood; he's got mad beats, too, and tells his family's story in verse. This is a fast and furious novel of family and brotherhood.

The Boys Who Challenged Hitler: Knud Pedersen and the Churchill Club Phillip Hoose

At the outset of World War II, Denmark did not resist German occupation. Deeply ashamed, fifteen-year-old Knud Pedersen resolved to take action against the Nazis. With his brother and friends, he formed a secret club and named it after the British leader, Winston Churchill. The Churchill Club committed countless acts of sabotage, infuriating the Germans, who eventually had the boys tracked down and arrested.
