

FOREWORD









SCIENCE

The science department prepares students for continued study in the field of science and informs students of the impact of science on human life so that they will be prepared to conduct themselves as an intelligent citizenry.

This year the science department offers courses in General Science, Biology I and II, Chemistry I and Practical Chemistry. Chemistry is now offered in the junior year as well as the senior year and physics is offered in the senior year. This allows a student to complete two years of mathematics in preparation for the course in physics and, at the same time, accommodates transfer students.

Special projects carried on by the science department include participating in the school and the state science fairs, sponsoring advanced students who attend U. R. I. and Brown University weekly, and participating in the Science Talent Search and the Future Scientists of America Program. Activities sponsored by this department are field trips to universities and industries of the state, the Atoms for Peace exhibit, the Visiting Scientist sprogram in physics and biology, recognition to outstanding science students, and three science clubs within the school program.

MATHEMATICS

The courses, activities, and units of instruction in the mathematics curriculum are designed to contribute to the common needs of high school pupils. The curriculum provides for a sequential presentation of general and special mathematics, contributing to present and probably future educational, vocational, and cultural mathematics needs of individual pupils.

The activities sponsored by the Mathematics Department are the Math Club and the Math Contest. A special project this year is the improvement of our high school mathematics program consistent with the recommendations of the several school mathematics study groups. The Mathematics Department offers the following courses: Algebra I, Plane Geometry, Trigonometry, Review Mathematics, General Mathematics I and II, and Shop Mathematics.



SOCIAL STUDIES

The social studies department acquaints students with different countries of the world and the customs of their people, the operation of our local, state, and national governments, the history of our own country and that of the world and the role which they must play as responsible citizens in their own communities.

Special projects of the department include field trips to Sturbridge village and to the United Nations in New York City for American History and American Government classes respectively. Coventry participates in the Rhode Island Model Legislature project, awards prizes for excellence in current events, and students in American Government plan activities culminating on the day in which they take over the chief elective and appointive offices in the town.

Use is made of films, filmstrips, recordings, maps, speakers, and field trips in addition to those mentioned whenever it is felt that these devices lend themselves to a better understanding of the subject being presented and further the goal of the department by helping to develop a mature and intelligent citizenry.

GUIDANCE

Through a program of testing abilities and aptitudes of students, a program of individual counseling, the dissemination of career information, and the arranging of student schedules, the guidance department helps students to become more aware of their own special abilities and needs, to adjust to the differing demands of home, school, and community, and to prepare for adult responsibilities.

Special attention is being given to the problem of drop-outs and follow-up studies are being conducted in connection with former students who have now graduated in an attempt to measure the effectiveness of the guidance program and to discover ways and means of improving it.

Informational records are also kept for reference in the event that prospective employers, officials of other schools and colleges, and members of the high school faculty may evaluate an individual student more completely.

Insofar as possible, parent-counselor conferences are encouraged so that the home and school may work together more effectively.

Special plans of the department include arrangements for representatives from colleges as well as business and professional men to familiarize students with important vocations.

FOREIGN LANGUAGES

Students at Coventry High School study languages as a means of communication of ideas directed towards the understanding of the way of life of other people. The ability to read, write, speak and understand a foreign language is learned as a part of appreciating the total culture of the people who have used that language to express their ideas.

At present, courses are offered in French I, II, and III, Spanish I and II, and Latin I and II. Students en-

rolled in these subjects work on special projects to extend their knowledge in particular aspects of French, Spanish or Latin such as art, music, education and the like.

Special projects of the foreign language department include annual exhibits at open house, the awarding of honors for achievement on competitive, standardized tests, and the sponsoring of club activities.

PRACTICAL ARTS

The practical arts department can be separated into three divisions: industrial arts, home economics, and agriculture. Industrial arts offers a curriculum designed to meet the pupil's needs related to the use of industrial goods and services in the home and the community through courses such as drafting, woodworking, auto mechanics, and general shop.

The home economics curriculum consists of instruction to satisfy the home and family life and sometimes the vocational needs of pupils through homemaking courses, and activities like homemaking and sewing clubs.

Vocational agriculture serves to give the student a beginning and advance in agriculture, to help him produce farm and market products efficiently, to conserve natural resources, and to manage an agricultural business efficiently through vocational agriculture courses and the Future Farmers of America activities.

FINE ARTS

Courses and activities offered by the fine arts department help students to acquire those skills necessary for meaningful and creative self expression. 


GIRLS' CHORUS
