Success or failure in all subjects and in life itself is largely dependent upon one's ability to communicate. The goal of the English Department is to develop maximum communication skills within the capabilities of each student. We English teachers hope to aid our students to think more clearly, to listen more intelligently, to express their ideas in speech and in writing with greater clarity and correctness, and to read with increased understanding and appreciation.

The attainment of these general objectives has been approached through the following specific procedures: the appointment in September 1960 of a certified teacher of speech, and the institution in Grade 10 of a required course in speech; the appointment in September 1961 of an experienced reading teacher who worked with students in Grades 9 and 10 last year and who implemented a schoolwide program in reading improvement this year; the replacement of worn-out literature texts with new books which meet the needs of students of various levels of ability; the increased use of audio-visual aids in 1961-1962; and the offering of good books at low cost through the Teenage Book Club.

NADYA WALL

We, the human race, have always been at war. Each generation has witnessed the horrors of war, and the brutality and ugliness that war is. Each generation has known the suffering and the grief and the bitterness that war brings. Each generation has acknowledged the uselessness of war, and each generation has condemned the immorality and destructiveness of war. Yet each succeeding generation has failed to secure peace.

He might have, for example, made war on another primitive man, perhaps from a different tribe, which worshipped different gods, spoke a different language, and had customs which seemed to the first primitive man, utterly foreign. We have built big, bustling cities; we have invented and used great machines; and we have become prosperous. We have produced many beautiful works of art; we have constructed great universities; and we have educated ourselves. We have erected magnificent cathedrals, churches, minarets, mosques, and temples in which we worship our creator. We have also made a large number of scientific advances. We have almost conquered desease and even time itself. We have explored the world we live in, and now we are exploring the universe, and eventually, the mystery of life. Yes, we have done all of these magnificent things, but we still cannot govern ourselves to live in peace. The accomplishment of which we are proudest is our ability to produce terrible weapons. This is proof, beyond a doubt, that basically, we are still primitives. We are still seeking to destroy what we do not understand. We are still using weapons to settle our differences. The only difference between ourselves, the people of the "enlightened age", and our early ancestors, the primitives, is the fact that we have invented the ultimate weapon. There will be no survivors in the next war. The wonderful accomplishments of the human race will be lost forever.
